Brent crude oil appears to currently have a resting rate of \$80 a barrel. That is what it averaged last year, and now at the end of the first quarter 2024 it would seem to still be well anchored in that zone regardless of or perhaps because of all the background drama of supply cuts, geopolitical risks and better than expected economic performance as all the printing presses have ensured we no longer have to endure pesky irritants likes recessions.


The sum of all the parts kept volatility at bay in Q1. However, an athlete's heart rate can increase by up to 200 beats per minute during training or competition. In the oil markets we would call that volatility. The forces that screamed and ricocheted in the background over the last three-months, which the oil market mostly ignored, may start to creep into shake up the snow globe in the second quarter.

We have seen early signs of that as geopolitical dramas have started to kick the door down as Brent broke out of the stable tight band of recent months to close repeatedly above \$85 a barrel over the last week as Russian refineries were hit by Ukrainian drone strikes and the IEA once again revised up its 2024 demand forecasts. During both her print and broadcast career, Dyala has interviewed a cross-section of international business and political leaders, including U.S. President Bill Clinton, Secretary of State James Baker, Energy Secretary Bill Richardson, French President Jacques Chirac, Azerbaijan's President Haidar Aliyev, Lebanon's Prime Minister Fuad Siniora, Queen Rania of Jordan and Sir Bob Geldof, along with most Middle East Energy and Finance ministers over the last 25 years. In 2009, Dyala became a Founding Partner and Editor in Chief of Gulf Intelligence, which has grown into the leading home-grown energy publisher & consultancy in the Middle East, Dyala attained a BSc, in Economics and History from the University of London and an MA in Arab Studies from the School of Foreign Service, Georgetown University, Washington D.C.
